Other important budget-related sessions included a Loudoun County Public Schools budget presentation on Feb. 22, and a special meeting of the Finance, Government, Operations & Economic Development group on February 23. The budget totals \$2.5 billion in appropriations for the general county government and school systems.


Hunter **Snags The Big Game**



ASK DR. MIKE

Dr. Mike.

My husband thinks that I'm harming our son for life because of the way I parent. Our son is 12 years old and he was diagnosed with ADHD in the 1st grade. My husband calls me "the

enabler" because I admittedly double or triple check things for our son, give him constant reminders, and stay up late with him to get homework and projects done. My husband's approach to parenting our son is to leave him alone to fail. My husband's favorite line to me these days is "How will he ever learn how to do things for himself if you are always doing everything for him?" Our son isn't doing great at school these days already so I cannot agree to the hard knocks approach to parenting my husband believes in so much. Can you give me some advice on how to get through to my husband that being hands-on is a must when parenting a child with ADHD? Your input is appreciated.

Dear Concerned Parent,

All children with ADHD, to varying degrees, struggle with mastering executive functioning skills and abilities -- attention/concentration, organizing, initiating tasks, working memory, impulsivity, planning and

prioritizing, self-monitoring, reasoning and exercising good judgment. The prefrontal cortex is considered to be the main area of the brain associated with executive functioning and ADHD.

So, if your son has ADHD, he likely has executive functioning struggles and a weak frontal lobe, so to speak. You are right that the parents of a child with ADHD need to be more proactive and more hands on. But being proactive with your son doesn't mean over managing him.

By managing and reasonable expectations consistently and calmly, by breaking things down, by keeping a schedule, by reinforcing behaviors with rewards and consequences, by modeling, by being supportive and loving, and by repeating, repeating, repeating, you can do a lot

LCSO Expands Into Western Loudoun

- By Nathaniel Stephens

Round Hill will soon host the newest staging and community outreach station for the Loudoun County Sheriff's Office, with construction crews nearing completion on a Western Loudoun Station on West Loudoun Street heading towards Route 7.

The station has been in the works since 2008, and will be run by the civilian and law enforcement staff now occupying a small leased room above the Round Hill town offices. A welcome change of scenery, the new complex will provide 9,000 sq. ft. of space to include a community room, a gym, locker rooms and administrative areas. At first impression large, the western facility's footprint is in fact small in comparison to the other spaces from which the Sheriff's Office operates in other parts of the county.

The new complex is part of the department's efforts at improved service, technology, efficiency, professionalism and reach. Related initiatives include an

expanded Drug Abuse Resistance Education program – now operating in both elementary and middle schools, the establishment of a cold case squad, greater media outreach, on-line reporting, new human resource and training efforts and efforts to decentralize the Sheriff's Office in Leesburg.

Said Sheriff Chapman, "The new Western Loudoun Station represents a major part in the decentralization as well as the STEP UP program ... [and putting] more resources closer to the community ... Having some of our detectives and community resource officers work out of these stations ... allows them to focus specifically on crime trends and quality of life issues in the specific area ... The location is centralized in the western portion of the county which will provide a quicker response for deputies to all sectors."

The country's presidential campaign has brought to light trends of increased heroin addiction. The western Loudoun

Community Input Charette For Purcellville Crossroads March 3, 6:30-9 p.m. Carver Center

Kline, the applicant of Pleasants Purcellville Crossroads Annexation application is having a community input charrette Thursday, March 3 from 6:30-9 p.m. at the Carver Center in Purcellville. This is an opportunity for the public to give their input and ask questions about the proposed project.

The proposed annexation is for a mixed use development on 50 acres north of the 7 bypass and west of Route 287/Berlin Turnpike (and Saint Francis Court). The property, which is in the county, is zoned for 1 house per 3 acres which would be approximately 16 homes. The proposal is to annex the property into the Town of Purcellville to have access to town utilities thus having access to increased density. The developers are proposing 74 single family dwellings, 75,000 square feet of mixed commercial to include restaurants and retail, an 80 room hotel, a proposed arts building, children's splash pad, a performer's park and Tilley's (entertainment) to include go karts and bumper boats to name a few offerings. The indoor entertainment of Tilley's would also have $bowling, laser\, tag, arcade\, games\, and\, restaurants.$ There will be an outdoor area for tents, parties or events. The hours of operation would be 10 p.m. weekdays and midnight on the weekends opening at 9 or 10 a.m.

I hear a lot of talk these days from politicians promising to make our country great again. It got me thinking – what makes America great, and how do we foster that?

The list of things that shape and determine America's greatness is as short and simple as it is profound:

We work hard

We innovate. (Call it Yankee ingenuity or can-do spirit, but we do our best to get it done, with what we have.)

We are a land of opportunity.

We are a diverse and accepting country. We pitch in to help each other.

No, we are not perfect in any one of these areas – not by a long stretch. But, our efforts across all of them help distinguish us from many other countries.

A classic American tradition representing the first three characteristics is the lone inventor, hunched over a workbench late at night, long after his or her family has gone to bed, struggling to solve some problem.

mop in the recent movie "Joy." But, I also particularly like the more commonplace stories of John Deere and Eli Whitney. Whitney grew up as a farm boy who liked to tinker, and spent one winter working on a major problem his neighbors faced when processing the cotton they grew. He succeeded, and his cotton gin transformed an industry and a regional economy. Deere was a small town blacksmith who had an idea how he could help the local farmers, and he crafted a plow that transformed the agriculture of the world.

America's heritage includes impacts like these across a number of sectors, not the least of which are auto, aviation, and personal computing. All were started by hobbyists, often in basements and garages, and all grew into major portions of the world economy.

It's easy to think that America has stopped making things, and we're now focused on making bits. We see that here, in Loudoun, where our own economy is often associated with IT, software and cloud computing. One could assume that only big companies in America had the capital to make stuff anymore, and even this they often do through offshore manufacturing.

But, fortunately, this isn't true. Individual Americans are, still, very busy re-inventing the making of things, and we call this the maker movement. Making things as a hobby or a

Makersmiths Is On The Move In Purcellville

Incorporated in Virginia in September of 2014, Makersmiths opened its first makerspace in Leesburg in August of 2015, and held its first annual Loudoun County Maker Fair in October.

Makersmith's 3,000 sq. ft. Leesburg facility features a variety of what are known as "flex spaces," including a woodshop, a metal shop, a vehicle shop, a craft room, an electronics/3D area, a general classroom and others. Shared tools and equipment include 3D printers, milling machines, laser cutters and more. Recent programs and events have focused on everything from internet radio, to soldering, woodworking, electronics, 3D modeling, metalworking, printing, and neopixel technologies.

In December of 2015, Executive Director Pat Scannell made a formal proposal to the Town of Purcellville to give his organization a crack at rehabilitating a 9-acre unused piece of town property near the intersection of A and South 20th Streets. Scannell proposes to transform the property into a place fashioned after the group's Leesburg makerspace.

The Makersmith organization benefits from the brainpower and expertise of hundreds of national and local innovators, manufacturers, educators and technology experts – from businesses and organizations as diverse as NOVA Systems Solutions, the United States Air Force, SkillsUSA, the Howard Hughes Medical Institute, and the Children's Science Center.

Proponents of the Purcellville idea see great promise in making Purcellville one of Makersmith's newest – and earliest – pioneer communities.

Some of you may have heard about Makersmiths, and the maker movement, and about how a group of us Loudoun residents want to expand from our Leesburg makerspace, and find additional space in the Purcellville area. You can learn more about the maker movement through the local and national media and Google, including past stories in this newspaper. The Virginia Municipal League also featured Makersmiths as part of a 2015 cover story about how the maker movement could be

an enabling force of economic, educational, community and cultural growth for communities across the state.

If you have time, please track us down. My point is that a makerspace is a community-gathering place for people with ideas who are looking for a place to build them. We provide the tools, space and community where you can make things you dream up. You can work hard there. You can innovate. You can create your own opportunities. You will certainly be among a diverse crowd of makers, and they will accept you. They will most definitely pitch in to help you. Along the way you will learn new skills, and even have fun.

The thing I first noticed upon making an actual visit to this place was: It actually has a babbling brook. If you walk along the path toward the western end of Georgetown Park, I found that the level of water complemented the scattered rocks strewn in its bed so as



to maintain a constant 'chatter.' Pretty cool, I thought. The usually humble Town Branch pretty much parallels the W and OD Trail in this section of the community; maybe the 'running water' encourages the small army of joggers, bikers and walkers out here to keep moving along.

The Park seemed larger to me than just its official halfacre, maybe due to its elongated configuration - stretching east and west, with those lines of liquid, grass, brick and blacktop emphasizing its length. Now, I'm not sure if there really is a traffic-free time of day along this part of King Street, so you need to look both ways if you decide to cross over to the other side of the bridge; I was drawn to the more 'non-vehicular' sections of the location, with some mature trees, landscaped flower beds, walking trails and benches. The natural amenities here offer a bit more of a sense of seclusion the further you get from the 'main drag' out near the little bridge. If I had to get any serious reading done out here, I'd opt for one of the benches along South Street, rather than the more exposed specimens: Even Herman Melville wouldn't stand much of a chance against all the distracting movement out on the road. But, on the other hand, if one wanted to select a prime viewing point for one of the local events which pass this way every several months - the annual Halloween, Fourth of July and Christmas Parades – well, then – give me one of those vantage points as close as possible to King Street – to be able to look the participants in the eye and cheer them on in their progress. Having participated in many of these marches - on foot and by motor – I always found it a refreshing bit of the journey to pass over the Town Branch at this spot. Even the daily motorists throughout the rest of the year may find it just a wee bit of a respite in their commute – sliding past this slip of a Park in a brief moment - then returning to the rigors of other traffic along the way.

And, in another variety of passing by, imagine the march of time over the past several centuries – as seen from this



same bridge along King Street. How it must have looked back in 1757 – for instance – when the original founders divvied up the first 60 acres - 70 lots - which they - on first inspiration - dubbed 'George Town?' Officially renamed Leesburg the following year - imagine the tumult in the community – and let's just say this present-day Georgetown Park spot in particular – during the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812 (when Leesburg - for a flickering moment in our nation's history - served as an impromptu site for the National Archives of the then-young United States), the lengthy years of the Civil War (when this same County Seat of Loudoun reportedly exchanged hands - between the North and South - some hundred and fifty times), then across the days of what we now call 'modern warfare' of World Wars I and II, Korea, Vietnam, Desert Storm, and the Post 9/11 days of today. Then – consider the restorative times of peaceful healing for humankind - as seen from this one small spot in the Historic District of a place we once knew as George Town: the days of the Declaration of Independence, the Inaugurations of our greatest Presidents, the Emancipation Proclamation and continued struggle for rights, privileges and dignity for all peoples, the inspiration for and implementation of the Marshall Plan - drawn up by one of the more prominent of our Town's residents (with Dodona Manor just several stones' throws away from this same Georgetown Park site), or the Monroe Doctrine (penned a few miles down the Old Carolina Road) - and, very humbly I lastly submit this recent narrative - knocked out on my home keyboard barely a half-mile from our beloved Georgetown Park - and the entire cycle completed by your gracious reading of same.

Now – who's to describe this local feature as a mere half-acre of land – barely 20 yards wide – when it's participated thusly in our lives? I give you Georgetown Park, Leesburg Virginia.

Fido's Facts **Plastic Pet Food Bins**

We love to use plastic bins to store kibble. It's quick, keeps food fresh and stores easily. However there are some things to consider before you dump your pets food into this potential health risk haven. Residual oils and fats that transfer to the bin can become rancid after time and contaminate new fresh food. Plastic bins may get micro cuts not visible to the eye. These areas can also harbor all kinds of nasty little buggers that can spoil your pet's food. Mold spores or bacteria can contaminate the kibble which



can lead to diarrhea and vomiting.

I recommend you open the bag and place (the bag containing the kibble) it inside of the bin. This reduces the risk of transferring anything onto the plastic. If you wash out the bin, use hot water, light soap and rinse well.

Going into March, the county will hold a series of budget work sessions at the Government Center in Leesburg on March 2, 7, 10, 15, 21 and 24 – each session runs from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m.

Budget Document -Long But Worth A Skim

Although well over 600 pages in length, the county's budget document has lots of easy to read listings, charts and graphs to help people get an idea of what it all might mean to the average citizen.

The budget document itself - available at www.loudoun.gov/budget - is wellorganized and packed with information, including:

- · Detailed listings of all county revenues and sources - from property taxes to parking fines to state and federal government aid.
- Property taxes discussions and analysis,

including forecasts into 2018.

- Detailed Government Administration budgets – for the Board of Supervisors, the Commissioner of Revenue, the County Attorney, General Services, the Clerk of the Court, Elections and Voter Registration, and more.
- Department budgets including 2015 actuals, the 2016 adopted figures, the 2017 proposed figures and the 2018 projected figures for each area as well as their individual staffing trends.
- The major functions of all government commissions departments are also discussed, as well as what they did with the taxpayer's money.

Interested to know how many electronic titles were downloaded at area libraries with your tax dollars? How many emergency calls our Fire, Rescue and Emergency management centers manage? How many youth received probationary services? How many aspiring

farmers were served by our community horticulture and environmental stewardship programs? What were the county's capital expenditures in the informational technology area? What is the county's debt to expenditures ratio? All worth learning about, depending on what interests you.

Citizens Asked To Weigh In

Administrator Hemstreet's proposed budget was based on the current real property tax rate of \$1.135 (this matches the county's equalized tax rate), but other scenarios are outlined as well.

In an email communication in early February newly elected Board of Supervisors Chair Phyllis Randall emphasized the need for citizen involvement in the process. Said Randal: "I invite you to ... voice your concerns ... your opinion matters ... I want you to be involved in the process.

Randall also hopes residents will comment on Loudoun County property tax rates, asking, specifically: "What tax rate do you support per \$100 in assessed value? ... \$1.135 underfunds County budget by \$5.5 M and LCPS budget by \$31.4 M ... \$1.140 funds County budget, underfunds LCPS budget by \$31.4 M ... \$1.150 funds County budget, underfunds LCPS budget by \$20.7 M ... \$1.170 fully funds County and LCPS budget."

properly representing the Sterling District, upgrading public facilities in his district, improving education by fully funding the Loudoun County Public Schools' proposed budget, providing all-day kindergarten, and finally expanding road systems and public transportation.

Saines feels that the Sterling District has been underrepresented by the previous representative, who he believes had actively prevented the county from making community improvements. Saines plans to make up for lost time by allocating funds to revamp public facilities such as libraries, firehouses, and community centers.

"Fighting for local government resources and community services in Sterling to bring them up to the standard that is common in other areas of the county was a big campaign issue for me. Additionally, revitalizing the Sterling area, specifically addressing the Sterling Park Plaza was another important focus of my campaign. Throughout my campaign I said that I wanted to make sure the entire Sterling community is represented and has their voice heard. Where possible, I will be including bilingual outreach in my communications. I look forward to holding more community town hall meetings, and using social media to keep apprised of the continuing needs of the Sterling District."

Saines feels that the BOS has a great deal of work ahead, in not only upgrading the services in Sterling, but also in providing up-to-date education that is competitive with surrounding localities and the nation. Loudoun County currently does not offer all-day kindergarten to parents, and is one of the few places in the State to not do so. Saines and others on the BOS plan to change that in the coming days along with supporting the budget proposed by LCPS.

Referring to funding statistics, Saines has said, "Over the last few years, excluding last year, the previous BOS continually

provided less funding than was requested by the school board and the superintendent. When adjusted for inflation we are spending less per student now than in 2009. Continuing to ask our teachers and administrators to do more with less is putting an unneeded burden on our school system. We should be putting students and teachers first making sure that our children continue to receive a first-rate education. By reducing class sizes, providing more technology funding, and ensuring a salary that makes LCPS competitive in the search for the best teachers, we can ensure our kids get a first class education."

Traffic is a continuing problem in Loudoun as the population grows and commuters commute further. plans to work with board members to develop roads before housing expansions are established while, at the same time, growing the accessibility to public transportation for residents. "Obviously the traffic situation in Loudoun County needs to be addressed. We need to figure out the situation with the Greenway, finding a way to reduce tolls, and in general providing transportation alternatives so that Loudoun's citizens can spend less time in traffic and more time with their families. I am a strong supporter of telecommuting, as well as improving the local commuter bus system to reduce congestion on all of Loudoun's roads."

In the meantime, Saines and his staff are working hard to improve Sterling and Loudoun County with the other members of the BOS. Said Saines, "... my staff is working primarily on the upcoming budget. Additionally they are working on a couple of development applications in our district, as well as immersing themselves in learning more about county programs. One specific issue they are working on is figuring out ways we can improve transportation and pedestrian connectivity throughout Sterling."

Saines lives with his eight year old son Gabriel. "I have coached my son's baseball as an assistant coach for the last four years. This winter I started coaching my son's basketball team, and so far am really enjoying myself," said Saines. When he is not busy working, or spending time with his son, he enjoys traveling through the county. "I have many friends and family that live all over Loudoun including Ashburn, Leesburg and the Aldie area. I really enjoy Western Loudoun's open landscape and rural culture. I particularly enjoy driving along Route 15 on a lazy Sunday afternoon. Being able to see the farm land and agricultural foundations of western Loudoun you really appreciate how diverse our county is," he said.

From Total Collapse To Spectacular Rebirth

- Abernethy & Spencer Reopens In Spring-Like Splendor -

"We will be ready for customers March 1 ... "So promised – and delivered – the indomitable David Lohman of Abernathy & Spencer Greenhouse in Lincoln, which re-opened for business this week after their traditional 3-month winter hiatus ... and a collapsed greenhouse.

A&S faced catastrophe in late January when the steel frame of a large 40-year old greenhouse buckled under the weight of the 3-plus feet of snow brought on by

the infamous blizzard of 2016. Lohman, who recently purchased the historic Springdale Inn - 1/2 mile from A&S - heard the crash from his home and rushed up the road to survey the damage. In very short order Lincoln and the surrounding community - some four-dozen neighbors, friends and customers – where there to pitch in, helping Lohman salvage what he could in what long-time resident Jean Brown described as a "veritable bucket brigade." While no one was hurt in the collapse, thousands of spring plants and tropicals were destroyed. "It was a big loss," said Frank Ellmore, who has worked for A&S for many years. "The structure was not one of the historic 110-year-old glass greenhouses at the nursery, but a 45,000-squarefoot steel and plastic structure ... the company's largest greenhouse."

Covered by insurance and determined to make his customary March 1 opening date, Lohman and A&S managed to pull

off the impossible. By mid-February some 50 workers from northern

Ohio had begun assembling a new green house, which, Lohman proudly says will bring a 40 percent reduction in heat costs, an over 50 percent savings in electricity, and, with drip irrigation, an over 60 percent savings in water. "The new green house is state of the art and will save so much water and energy for the community," said Lohman.

Abernethy & Spencer has been in business for 100 years and is one of the Mid-Atlantic's oldest greenhouses. The business operates on over 5 acres and sells perennials, annuals, trees, ferns and vines, as well as herb and vegetable plants, gardening tools, seeds, pottery and more. March In The Garden - Soil As The Gardener's Canvas

Gardening is all about growing things, and growing things successfully is about cultivating healthy soils – the canvas upon which gardener visits their magic.

For the March gardener, this means working carefully to release and build upon the nutrients, textures and living things developed and stored in the soil over the winter

Your garden didn't so much lay dormant over the last few months as it did undergo subtle metabolic changes to be in position to burst into new life come spring.

Last fall your deciduous trees were moving the nutrients that had built up in their leaves into their branches, where they would be deposited in their bark and available to the tree during the next growing season.

Responding to winter's freezing temperatures, the leftover fruits and berries on trees and shrubs had turned starches into sugars, inviting birds and other wildlife to the table and dispersing the seeds of the next generation.

The roots of your annuals were lying dormant, preparing to launch new life when the temperature, and moisture and sunlight levels suited their biological needs.

If you simply mulched or covered your garden in place last fall, rich levels of microbes, along with pollinators and other beneficial insects nestled into the available organic material to escape winter's coldest temperatures and conditions.

In March, the temperature highs will be in the 52-degree range, with well over 11 hours of sunlight. So, now is the time to tend to your soil:

• First, work in any cover crops you laid down last fall,



or any of the light organic debris that have collected on the surface.

- Cover the soil with an inch or so of good organic compost material.
- Loosen the soil up with a trowel, digging fork or tiller until it
 has a crumbly consistency, removing stones and large pieces
 of organic material. This aerates the soil and lets the warmth
 of spring seep in.
- Apply and blend in organic fertilizers specific to what you will plant – if needed and in appropriate amounts.
 There are lots of great tips – including ways to get free,


organic soil conditioners into your soil – your canvas – on the web.


Botanists tell us that for every four-leaf clover you might find, there are 10,000 three-leaf clovers. That means that you will find at least 1 four-leaf clover in an area that is about, well, 13 square feet. Humm. That's a lot of area to cover with your magnifying glass.



Playing The Market

Part of growing up involves the achievement of self-sufficiency. My parents breathed a huge sigh of relief when I obtained a job last fall because they knew that after 22 years they were finally off the hook. Or so they hope. Although I still live with them, so I guess not completely ... I digress. Anyway, part of self-sufficiency involves deciding what to do with the money you earn. There is not always a simple answer, and there are inherent risks involved in this process. One can choose to leave their money in a savings account in which a painfully small amount of interest is accumulated each month. Or they can roll the dice and choose to invest a slice of their hard earned cash in the both beloved and reviled stock market. Even after reading Flash Boys by Michael Lewis, my continual frustration by the lack of interest accumulating in my savings account won out. I chose to roll the dice.

I set out to find the top-rated investments for 2016. After speaking with a family friend in the financial industry, he told me that I have access to all of the resources offered to stock brokers and the like. They read The Economist, Businessweek, and my personal favorite, The Motley Fool. Instead of paying someone else to tell me what to do, I got to work reading up on the exciting, high stakes game of stock market investment. The Motley Fool identified top growth stocks for 2016. Splunk, a data analytics company, and FireEye, a cyber intelligence firm, were both identified as promising investments.

Wait, FireEye ... that name sounds familiar! I met one of their representatives at the career fair last fall. He was a nice man, highly intelligent and passionate about the company. When my friend and I approached the booth, he talked with us for a few minutes. My friend, who is very passionate about FireEye, was highly disappointed when we were informed that they were only interested in hiring interns. But, said the representative with a smile, they were planning to greatly expand in the future. My friend looked dejected, but it was hard to be mad at the guy. He said everything with a smile and a thick Australian accent. My friend seemed a little bitter when I told him I was thinking of investing in FireEye. I told him to blame Motley Fool, not me.

There is a warning attached to these stocks that have been identified as high growth, a sort of "buyers beware" notice. Investors should be reminded that "volatility is part of the game." Past investments that The Motley Fool has recommended, such as Netflix and Amazon, "have experienced more than a 50 percent loss in a single year" before going on to generate excellent returns. Investors are being asked to practice patience, and encouraged to focus on the long-term, rather than bank on "get rich quick" schemes.

So in reaction to this sage advice, I have decided to practice a "buy and hold" strategy. Buy a stock from a solid company and hold it, instead of trying to sell quickly in order to make a quick buck. The market goes up and down. People tend to panic when the market goes down. When I opened up an investment account I was asked about my risk tolerance. I learned that my risk tolerance is very high. Maybe it is due to youth, or my faith in the markets. My investments don't keep me up at night, although I did see that my stocks fell this afternoon. My hypothesis may unravel soon.

As my friends and family can attest, I have taken a keen interest in the market, watching my investments go up and down each day. I have been on the phone with my broker more times than I can count. They probably have learned to flag my number each time I call. I might be getting a reputation. Although they seem to enjoy lauding me for my excellent financial decisions each time I call. I really just want to talk about my account, but the advisors seem to be more interested in telling me how smart I am for investing in the market so young. I wonder when this praise will end. Maybe when I hit 25 ... or 30?

Over the past few months I have learned that the stock market is not a place to get rich quick. Yet with careful investing, it could yield impressive results. I will close with a personal anecdote to illustrate the point. A family member told me that they invested in Medtronic, Inc., a medical device company headquartered in Ireland. When they invested in the early 1990's, it was trading at about five dollars a share. In January, it was trading for around 75 dollars a share. After holding onto the stock for more than twenty-five years, they have reaped an excellent return on investment. This relative might regret telling me this story. Lunch is on them the next time we go out.

Samuel Moore-Sobel's interest in the stock market has blossomed into a full-on obsession. He regularly dispenses financial advice to anyone who will listen and has become a strong advocate for investing in the stock market.

station will begin an initiative to fight heroin abuse by treating overdoses with Narcan (Naloxone) as part of a larger program partnering with Congresswoman Barbara Comstock, representing Virginia's 10th District. "The way to combat the heroin scourge in our community is to work collaboratively with local, state, and federal law enforcement officials. I teamed up with Loudoun County Sheriff Mike Chapman last April and launched the Heroin Operations Team initiative that brings together law enforcement on all levels with local officials. As part of HOT, the Drug Enforcement Agency opened an interactive traveling museum to the public earlier this year in Leesburg, and Loudoun County Public Schools will have students visit so they understand the consequences of drug use and abuse and how it destroys lives. I will continue to work with our law enforcement and local officials to bring more awareness to the dangers of the heroin epidemic," said Congresswoman Barbara Comstock (R-VA)

The Sheriff's Office employs 600 deputies county-wide, thirty-eight of which will be stationed in Round Hill on a consistent basis for operations and patrols throughout western Loudoun, working from Middleburg to Purcellville and beyond.

"I would encourage all citizens in [western Loudoun] to be engaged with the members of LCSO who are assigned to the new station. I recommend everyone attend and participate in the [station's] quarterly meetings, use the new [community room] or simply stop in to the new station for a tour and to meet the deputies that are serving the community," said Chapman.





The Cavalry Might Not Be Able To Save The Day

We in the United States have always taken our Army for granted. It is assumed that it will be able to tackle any crisis, no matter where and how



large, without said crisis adversely affecting the American public. This complacency has led us to overlook the slow decline of our Army, a decline that has compromised the Army's stated goal.

All through the Cold War, it was the goal of the Army to have enough forces to fight and win simultaneous wars in two separate geographical regions of the world. This doctrine allowed the US Army to maintain a significant presence in Europe while fighting major wars in Asia at the same time and contributed greatly to US victory in the Cold War. This doctrine continues to

drive US Army deployments, and rightfully so. We have seen an explosion of potential enemies since 2009.

Russia is seeking to reassemble the Soviet Union through a method that contains many echoes of a certain German dictator's warmongering in the 1930s, Iran is becoming a major power in the Middle East again as it spreads its brand of Islamic terrorism, ISIS came out of nowhere to impose 8th Century Islamic law over vast swathes of the Middle East, Boko Haram is doing the same in Africa, China is actively undermining US relationships in Asia, and last, but not least, North Korea is boasting about using nuclear weapons with the tactfulness of a whiny brat.

Against this myriad of threats, several of which the current Administration either fails or refuses to recognize as true threats, said Administration has downsized the military, especially the Army, by at least 20 percent. For the Army, this has translated into a 46 percent cut of its research, development, and acquisition funds, a 20 percent reduction of personnel, and a deactivation of units, leaving the Army with 32 brigades. In contrast, over the same period, Chinese military spending increased by 143 percent, Russian military spending increased by 30 percent (somewhat tempered by the collapse of its currency, the ruble), and Iran, ISIS, Boko Haram, and North Korea continued to expand their forces, although the exact rate of increase is hard to determine due to lack of information from such repressive governments.

Furthermore, due to reduced training because of budget cuts and the need for combat personnel to temporarily serve other duties because of lack of support personnel, only 33 percent of the Army's Brigades are combat-ready at any given time. In order

for the Army to accomplish its stated goal, they needed 50 combat-ready brigades during the Cold War. Now, they have, at any given time, 11-12.

This has caused the Army to announce that they are currently unable to accomplish the goal of fighting and winning two simultaneous wars in two different regions in the world. America's principle instrument of military strength may be the Navy, but we need a strong Army to extend our power beyond the coast. Unless we reverse current trends, we might find ourselves in a position where we would be unable to stop a foreign invasion of one of our allies or even of the United States itself.




Comstock Announces 2016 Congressional Art Competition







Local Band To Help Less Fortunate Kids In Cleveland

Loudoun Music Instruction began when Frank Keim realized that instead of having his children take music lessons from somebody else, he could teach them himself. As he and his children worked hard, many people began to ask, "Who teaches those children?" Once word was spread around that it was he who was teaching them, there were several requests for him to teach other children as well. It was then that Loudoun Music Instruction became a business.

For the last 11 years, Keim has helped over 200 kids learn and play music. Keim says, "I owe them everything. The business has made me recognize the blessings that kids are and that if educated, respected, and challenged, they can accomplish great things."

There are about 100 kids at a time that attend LMI. Of those 100, 40 get offered a chance to be in a band. To be in the band, you must consistently practice, show passion, and do well in individual recitals.

For those who demonstrate a greater desire there is LMI's Weekend Music School which is composed of students that perform in the band The Immortals. This level requires years of proven commitment.

Keim says, "These kids are selected because they give me no choice but to pick them. It is a combination of musical ability, passion, commitment, discipline, creativity, leadership, organizational skill, intelligence and people skills."

All members of the Immortals have hard work and excellence in common. Keim says, "They count on one another, write, rehearse, record, play high profile shows, make and manage money, fight, cry, and grow up." Once graduated, they understand just what it means to be a musician. Keim says, "In fact, there have been 5 scholarships awarded to Immortals students, from the University of the Arts to the US Naval Academy. There are former Immortals who are successful in all walks of life and I remember and miss them all. Each one contributed something amazing that helped me build the program into what it has become."

as parents to bring about change for your child

Manage and support reasonable expectations consistently. It's not uncommon for a parent of a child with ADHD to have disagreements with their child. That's because the parent may not always appreciate what it's like to have executive functioning struggles. If you ask your son to do his homework, he should just do it, right? Wrong. A child with ADHD will often require more structure in these sorts of moments. That's why it's important for the parent or parents of a child with ADHD to be reasonable when it comes to expectations. And a child with ADHD may need the said expectation or responsibility overly defined initially.

Based on what you've described, your son likely has the capacity to do more, but his ADHD is interfering. As a loving mother, it seems that your solution is to jump in at times to make sure things get done. But this approach is upsetting your husband, and to his point, you may be doing more for your son than you should be. Instead of doing things for your son, do things with your son. So, when it comes to homework, you could sit with your son while he does it and assist only when necessary. If he has chores, you can do your own household tasks alongside your son while he completes his own. By managing and supporting your son consistently in this way, he will internalize the success he experiences in these moments, and this will allow for real learning and change to occur.

Break things down. ADHD is a neurodevelopmental condition that impacts information processing, and children with ADHD tend to get overwhelmed when there is too much information coming in at one time. Thus, keeping things simple for your son should also lead to good results. One way to do this would be to break things down for your son across his day.

Keep a schedule. Children with ADHD typically benefit from having a schedule to stay on top of things. And in today's technology driven world, having an on-line schedule (e.g., Google or Apple Calendar), is a good way to introduce scheduling to a child. If your son has his own phone, you and your son could color code his activities and responsibilities into his day on the phone, and you could even program reminders or alarms. If your son doesn't have a smart phone at 12, you could use a computer or a laptop to help him with organization, time management and task completion. Whether your son uses a paper schedule or an on-line one, it will work best if he uses it over and over again and in the same way. Research on forming habits has shown that we can learn a new habit within just a few weeks when we practice the new behavior consistently.

Reinforce behaviors with praise, rewards and consequences. It's human nature to want new things, and it's also human nature to want to keep the things that we have and like. Rewarding your son for a job well done will get him some of the things that he wants, and over time, it will also help him to feel better about himself. Thus, rewarding good

behavior creates a win: Win dynamic; there's both an external positive (good behavior equals getting things or keeping things) and there's an internal positive (getting things equals feeling good about oneself and oneself in relation to important others). In general, children want to do well, and they also want to make their parent or parents proud, so praise is a very important reinforcement tool for parents. And while I don't agree entirely with your husband's position as you've described it, I think children do need to learn from their mistakes in order to learn and grow. Natural consequences are part of life, and protecting your son from them is not good.

Model. There's an old saying, "Do as I say, and not as I do," and even the best parents fall prey to this sort of moment with their children from time to time. But as general rule, this is a horrible way to parent since children learn, in large part, from watching their parents. At 12, your son is developmentally at an age and period in his life where he is expected to identify more with his same sex parent. For preadolescent boys, these are what I call, "the shaving cream years" and, "the fishing trip years." This is the time in your son's life where he will be taking in his father's values beliefs and views on life in his own process toward manhood. Based on what you've written, it seems that you and your husband don't see eye to eye on your son's ADHD. My concern then is that your son, at 12 years of age, is aware of this, which could be upsetting to him. I recommend that your husband and you discuss the ways you would like to better model your expectations for your son; your son will do best when he sees his parents being more united in their support of his struggles and wellbeing.

Be supportive and loving. As you likely know, ADHD strategies are typically behavioral, but encouraging your son to express his thoughts and feelings is also important. At 12, your son needs to understand what it means for him to have ADHD, and behavior strategies alone will not lead to increased self-awareness or insight. He needs to be able to talk about the negative feelings he might be experiencing that are associated to his struggles, and he needs your support, guidance and loving feedback as parents to do better. Sharing some of your own struggles from childhood with your son can also be a supportive and loving parent intervention.

I hope that my suggestions here help you and your husband to move from a place of disagreement to a place of agreement regarding your son's ADHD. If things don't improve for your son within a reasonable period of time, I recommend that you seek out the assistance of a child psychologist who specializes in ADHD. That professional can work closely with your son (and you as parents) to address your concerns and your son's needs.




